Also known as White Oak.

Appearance// Has a tight grain pattern that tends to run in a V shape. Colour is yellowish which becomes more prominent with age and light exposure. Beautiful knots & grains. Ghost Marks common. Not to be confused with European Oak.

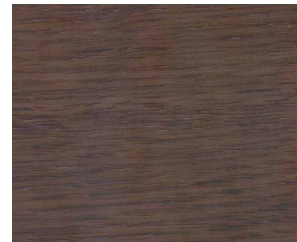

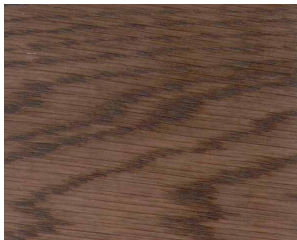

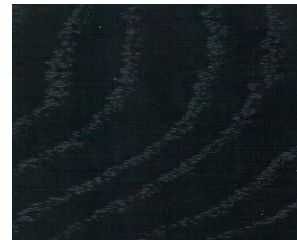
